Plans for Clymping's participation

Our three churches at Clymping, Yapton and Ford have now been open for worship since Easter, and we've seen good attendance – sometimes as many as we can fit in under Covid guidance. Al-

though we've got used to the type of service we've been restricted to, many of us have missed key elements that have not been possible. From the middle of July many of the legal restrictions we've experienced have been dropped, but we will continue to make church as safe as possible.

As August is always a quiet month, we will be running just one service across the Benefice each week, plus the Thursday service at Ford. In September, we intend to relaunch our worship services in Clymping and Yapton. There will be some new things happening, and some tweaking of old things.

At St Mary's Clymping, on the first and third Sunday of each month will be an All Age Family Communion at 11:00am. In these same weeks there will be a Family Service at St Mary's Yapton, starting at 9:30am (note the change of time).

The second and fourth weeks will be Communion Services at both churches. Also in the second and fourth weeks there will be Sunday school in Yapton church, running 11:00am–12:00pm. A number of folk have appreciated the quiet and briefer services we've been holding over the past few months. Although we won't be able to do this on Sundays, we will be maintaining this form of service at Ford on Thursdays at 10.00am. Also relaunching in the Autumn will be Messy Church, based at St Mary's Clymping. Fun for all the family, these events were very popular before Covid, and we hope to build on their success. Watch out for the Harvest special at the end of September.

If you've been part of our online family, or if spiritual things have been bubbling in you over these past historic 18 months, then consider dipping your toe into the shared experience of church. Take your time – no pressure, just a genuine welcome from fellow travellers.

Clymping emergency WhatsApp group

Clymping resident Ewout Benschop invites you to join a village WhatsApp group to help address emergencies.

Recently a resident posted in the Clymping Village Residents Facebook group about an event that was suspicious. An unknown man was walking in the field and was looking into the houses. She posted it on Facebook to warn others, but by

the time everybody had read it, the man was long gone.

To inform all residents immediately, the best way is to send a text message via WhatsApp. Within seconds you can notify everybody in the group that there is an

emergency or if there is something very suspicious going on in the village.

I have set up a WhatsApp Climping Emergency Group, and over 30 residents have already joined. The more residents join, the quicker we can alert everybody in case of an emergency. (Please note that group members' phone numbers are available to other members of the group.)

When I was still living in The Nether-

lands, we had a similar WhatsApp group with 300-plus residents participating. We prevented several house and car burglaries, and a missing child was found within 20 minutes, as everybody was on the lookout after the text message.

The key to a group like this is for everyone to abide by the guidelines and only send messages when appropriate. Examples of when to send a message:

- Medical emergency, like a cardiac arrest,
 - when an ambulance might take 20 minutes to get here.
 - Missing child.
 - Suspicious people making notes or photos of houses.
 - Suspicious van or car driving without purpose through the street.

The idea is to warn each other, and within minutes we can decide whether to ring the police if you are not sure if that is needed.

Revitalising the pond

Parish Council Chairman Colin Humphris describes improvement work at Horsemere Green pond.

I'm sure many of you will have noticed the removal of the reed overgrowth from the pond at Horsemere Green. The Parish Council were keen to have a pond to complement the wildflower meadow which is developing on the green opposite. (See the May 2021 issue for details about the creation of the wildflower meadow.)

The Council sought three quotations from pond experts to manage the pond more effectively, in line with the plan for the green and pond. Peter Birchall was selected, Sussex's own 'Pete the Pond' (you can watch videos of his work at www .youtube.com/c/PetethePond/videos).

Pete and his team worked carefully by hand to remove reeds and their root structures to clear the pond in traditional ways whilst protecting and retaining areas of natural habitat. Surrounding trees were also trimmed to remove overgrowth into the pond.

Once the disturbance has settled, Pete will be back later in the summer to stock the pond with a variety of native water plants, including marsh marigold, yellow and purple loosestrife, water mint, flowering rush, water lily and a variety of hornworts

to encourage the development of a more diverse and interesting natural habitat.

The pond is part of the village heritage shown on the oldest maps that I have seen. The story is that this is where the horses were washed off after working the fields, hence Horsemere Green. We are keen to preserve it in a sustainable way.

CHAIRMAN'S VIEW



Colin Humphris emphasises the need to maintain our say on the development of the village.

wo of our current councillors have noti-I fied me that they are planning to move away for family reasons. Currently we have five councillors and two vacancies. Should the Council reduce to three, it will create real difficulties. Legally we need a minimum of three members to vote on any issues, so there would be no scope for anyone to be away or non-voting due to an interest. The Parish Council might therefore find itself unable to comment on important development proposals. With just three, we are spread very thinly for the work undertaken by the Council, and we would represent a worryingly narrow viewpoint. If you have ever considered becoming a councillor, now would be a good time to come forward. I would be happy to discuss what is involved.

One key development is Foreman Homes and the proposed 300 new homes. Councillors met with Foreman Homes and had sight of their planned layout that will shortly be public. The good news is that they have listened to Council concerns about the layout and its impact on existing residents. They have designed around the archaeological areas of interest, providing a good deal of open space, and they agree with our concern about an exit into Horsemere Green Lane. I expect this all to become public shortly, but only after Arun District Council have had their say. The plan differs on some points of detail from that approved by the government inspector. We should expect a further planning application in September and will need a fully functional Council to be able to have our say or influence.

As promised in the May issue, we have developed a survey to consult with you on Horsemere Green Lane. This is included as a pull-out opposite. We are keen to understand your views and to be able to assess the level of community support for improvements to make the lane 'access only' for the benefit of residents and much safer for all non-vehicle users – pedestrians, cyclists and those with limited mobility. What could be done? To help you we have included four ideas - they are only ideas to get you thinking. Please respond, as we would have to demonstrate community support to take any proposals forward to West Sussex County Council for funding.

The controversial proposals for the extension to the wind farm, Rampion 2, are open for consultation until September 16th. Do have your say, as these will affect Clymping if the project proceeds: https://rampion2.com/consultation/.

I hope you all took the opportunity to comment on the proposals for the A259. The changes are important and needed, the congestion unfortunately inevitable.

Horsemere Green Lane - the future?

A Consultation from Clymping Parish Council (CPC)

We need to understand your views

Horsemere Green Lane (HGL) is an important local village road. It has the character of a country lane whilst providing the only access to 209 homes in the individual housing developments or along the lane. Traffic levels have increased as other drivers use the lane as a convenient through route or short cut, particularly at peak periods when the A259 is very congested.



Traffic calming and a 30 mph speed limit were introduced following joint work by the Parish Council and West Sussex Highways to discourage use and slow the traffic. But has this worked?

As you may have noticed recently, the Council has been monitoring the situation. We record both the number of vehicles and their speeds. Approximately 2000 vehicles a day use the lane, and of these approximately half exceed the speed limit, with recorded excessive speeds of up to 75 mph. This poses a risk to other users in the lane, especially pedestrians, dog walkers, those with limited mobility and cyclists. This risk is especially true given the lack of a continuous pathway.

The Council and its Highways Workgroup are very keen to understand how you feel about the lane as it is today and also your feelings about the future, given the plans for massive housing development in Yapton, Ford and Clymping totalling approximately 4000 new homes, and yet more industrial development at Ford (the incinerator).

The big question is, of course, what might be done? We have included four conceptual ideas/options. We must emphasise that these are not designed, costed or assessed for feasibility, but we are keen to stimulate some debate. You may

have other ideas. Currently neither Arun District Council nor West Sussex County Council (WSCC) have plans to ameliorate the future impact of the new developments on Horsemere Green Lane or its junction with Church Lane.

The Parish Council has considered 4 options but is not recommending any one of these at this stage as we would like to understand your preferences. They are in no particular order. We must emphasise that these have yet to be designed, costed or assessed for feasibility by the highways authority.

Our vision is that Horsemere Green Lane should be upgraded to provide 'access only' for residents in order to stop rat-running, with a multiuser pathway for pedestrians, cyclists etc. provided along its length.

Currently WSCC is consulting on junction improvements along the A259. In thinking about these options, it is important to understand that we are assuming improvements at the Oystercatcher and Church Lane junctions will be implemented.

The current options identified by CPC are:

<u>Option A</u> - a complete closure (blockage) of HGL at some point along its length. This might be at some point in the middle of HGL or at either end. This would make the lane either one or two cul de sacs. It would require construction of turning points and controlled access for emergency vehicles through the barrier point. A continuous multiuser pathway would be provided on the south side.

<u>Option B</u> - make HGL a one-way street (east to west), narrowing the carriageway for vehicles to allow space for a segregated multiuser pathway along the length of the lane. Making the lane east-west removes the need for the blind turning out into Church Lane.

<u>Option C</u> - Create a new traffic order for HGL to become an 'access only' street and enforce it by creating an electronic enforcement system using automatic number plate recognition technology (ANPR). Vehicles simply traversing the HGL could be recorded and reported based on the time taken to pass the cameras at each end of the lane. A continuous multiuser pathway would be provided on the south side.

<u>Option D</u> - make HGL an ultralow-speed route (10 or 15 mph) with a review and tightening of the present traffic calming and with a specific new walking and cycling area designated within the highway.

Speed Watch Group

Slowing down HGL

Local resident Ewout Benschop introduces the Climping Community Speed Watch group.

H orsemere Green Lane is getting busier and busier, and the speed of some road users is going up as well. As the A259 gets congested in the morning and afternoon rush hours, Horsemere Green Lane becomes a cut-through road.

The Parish Council has been monitoring the speed of traffic that uses Horsemere Green Lane over the past couple of weeks. Each week approximately 5,200 cars passed the Speed Indicator Device (SID) in the direction monitored, and approximately 2,000 of these each week were going faster than 35 mph. This presents a

danger for schoolchildren and other residents who walk along this road, as there are no pavements in places, and where there is a pavement it's very narrow.

A group of ten volunteers have started a Climping Community Speed Watch group and will shortly start monitoring speeding drivers on Horsemere Green Lane. All of our volunteers have completed an e-learning course and passed an exam to become a speed watch operator.

We will be operating in small groups of four volunteers stationed somewhere along Horsemere Green Lane. Drivers who go faster than 35 mph will be reported to Operation Crackdown, a joint initiative run by Sussex Safer Roads Partnership and Sussex Police that allows communities to report specific instances of antisocial driving such as speeding. Our aim is to reduce the number of speeding cars, as Horsemere Green Lane is still a country lane and it would appear that the traffic calming chicanes are not effective enough.

We are looking forward to the Autumn term, when we hope we will be able to resume much more of our community involvement as a school, as we hopefully edge back towards a more familiar 'normal'.




Above and below: artwork of the school by year 5 and 6 pupils

Report on St Mary's Clymping School Project



We had a big announcement at Arun District Council (ADC) in mid July that Nigel Lynn, our chief executive, is resigning and that we will have a new CEO in autumn. It will hopefully bring some new and positive times for Arun, and we wish Nigel well in his new job.

Clymping has some really good news regarding our Community Speed Watch group, as they have been given permission to monitor traffic down Horsemere Green Lane. I think this will be a great wake-up call to all those who think they can use this lane as a rat run, because drivers who aren't careful will face prosecution from the police if they get caught speeding three times. I just want to say a big thank you to those who have set this group up and will be helping to keep our village roads safer.

I am afraid that I also have to inform residents that an application for a fast food café and drive-through was passed at ADC

planning meeting on Wednesday, 21st July. The application itself, presented by Bald Kitchen representatives, would be a great idea, but just not in the vicinity of a little rural village, right next door to a listed building and on the edge of an extremely busy road with poor visibility and several awkward junctions close by.

The majority of Councillors agreed that the application was not suitable for the area, with concerns raised about its appearance and the number of cars it would attract, as the small parking area that already exists would become quite congested. It was also noted that no disabled bays have been designated, which is a shame because these days parking to accommodate everyone should be considered in any application, in my opinion.

Unfortunately, many councillors abstained from voting, as they felt there was no planning policy to stop the application being approved, so it was passed. Nevertheless, I will be monitoring the site, along with the Parish Council, and we will ensure, where we are able, that it has as little detrimental impact on our village as possible.

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
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
